

Read eBooks Without The Added Expense

Do you love to read? Books weighing you down? To get started with eBooks, you don't need to buy an eBook reader or spend any money to get started. **Karan Bajaj & Hitesh Raj Bhagat** show you how to get free, public domain eBooks on your existing smartphone or tablet

Convert an Existing Device into an eReader

Now that eBooks are easily available on different mobile operating systems (BlackBerry App World, Google eBooks, iOS iBooks), try out a few of these apps to get the optimum reading experience on your existing smartphone or tablet.

Android

The popular Aldiko Book Reader on Android supports epub and PDF formats and allows you to sort books via tags. It displays your collection in a bookshelf interface. For reading, it lets you adjust font sizes, font type, alignment, line spacing, background colour, brightness and also offers a night-time reading mode to reduce eye strain. You can also purchase eBooks from within the app. The free version is fully functional (ad-supported).

BlackBerry

While there are free cross platform apps available for BlackBerry, it lacks a dedicated free BB reading app. You can get the Playpub Book Reader for ₹50 which works with ePub, Mobi and PDF formats. It supports portrait and landscape modes, lets you sort books via collections and even offers a full file browser (with support for compressed files). You can choose the font size, brightness and switch between day/night modes.

iOS

iBooks is Apple's free reader app. It has a streamlined interface and lets you download books directly from the iBooks store. The app gives you seven font styles, three different page layouts and three page colours to customise the view. It supports ePub and PDF formats in 18 different languages and keeps your books in sync with other iOS devices via Apple's iCloud. You also get built-in search, bookmarking and AirPrint support.



EBook Marketplaces

IF YOU DON'T mind paying, you can look beyond the big names. There's a world of eBook retailers that sell at discounted prices. In fact, if you're looking to publish your own eBook, many of these places will allow you to do that for free, with only a royalty charged per sale. What's more, they don't charge as much as the big guys.

DID YOU KNOW?



On 3G Kindles, the cost of 3G is built into the price. There are no 3G download limits and no recurring costs for 3G ever - and you can use your 3G connection to download books worldwide.



You can read colour magazines for free. For instance, Zinio has a large collection of free magazines. Other places to read free magazines include www.turnit.com and <http://free.yudu.com>.



Just searching for 'eBook' on any app store will likely get you several free books that work as standalone apps. Once you're done reading, just uninstall the app and look for the next one.



While reading books on a device with an LCD, it helps to turn brightness down. You can also usually invert the text (black background and white text) for more comfortable reading.



Most eBook readers and apps can read PDF, .epub and .mobi files. If you have any of these files, you can simply transfer them to your device and they will appear in your library.



Every Kindle offers an easy way to transfer files. Head to www.amazon.com/myk to find out your device's email ID. Send files to that ID & they appear automatically on your device.



Monochrome eBook readers use low power e-Ink displays. But not all e-Ink displays are equal. Some offer higher resolution & display more shades of gray (better for images).
